# ATP Students Participate in Fuel for the Weekend Program

Students in BICO's Adult Transition Program (ATP) have recently been participating in the Hockomock Area YMCA's Fuel for the Weekend Program as part of their Service Learning Service project.

The Fuel for the Weekend Program provides weekend meals and snack bags to students to help bridge the nutrition gap over the weekend when students are not receiving food in school. Bags are delivered before the end of the week to students across several districts.

Each week, under the direction of teacher Kelly Messier, four ATP students visit the Hockomock YMCA in North Attleboro to participate in the program. Students are involved in processing orders, taking inventory, checking expiration dates and unloading, unpacking and stocking items.

Through this partnership, students develop a better understanding of food insecurities within their own communities and have the opportunity to practice employability skills through community service.

# Summit Students Thrive During Career Exploration Program

Under the direction of Career Readiness Coach Casey Foreman, students in BICO's Summit High School Program have been exploring a variety of local businesses as part of the career exploration program.

As part of the program, each month, Foreman invites a new professional speaker to Summit High School to speak to students about their professional backgrounds and various career opportunities available to students. The goal of the program is to explore a different industry each month to expose students to as many potential job options as possible throughout the school year.

During the month of November, Summit High School welcomed the owner of Inkify, LLC, Carlos Lobato. Inkify is a full-service contract screen printing and embroidery shop that provides highquality decorated apparel nationwide. Lobato spoke to students about his responsibilities, his educational background and his career path.

In January, Summit High School students visited Inkify, LLC, twice a week to learn about the operations of the business. Throughout the month, students learned about the screen printing and embroidery process and had the opportunity to work on entry-level tasks. Tasks included unboxing, counting, sorting and folding shirts as well as moving and organizing stock items.

"This type of experience is so important for students because they get to see what different types of jobs are out there," said Foreman. "They also get an idea of what is required and expected of them and that helps them to make informed decisions about their job or career options."

This trip served as part of the program's Hospitality and Tourism Career Cluster, which allows students to compare different industries and career paths.

Following the tour, Red Robin treated students and staff to a complimentary lunch. Students were able to sit down with the manager to ask questions while enjoying lunch.

### **EDLP and PDLP Students Take Part in Music Therapy**

Students in BICO's Preschool Developmental Learning Program (PDLP) and Elementary Developmental Learning Program (EDLP) have been enjoying music therapy sessions with HopeHealth PediPals representative Nicole.

Each Tuesday, Nicole visits EDLP and PDLP students for a 30-minute music session. Students are given musical instruments and sit in a circle while Nicole sings songs and leads students through a variety of musical games.

Nicole has previously worked with a handful of students outside of school hours through their involvement in HopeHealth's Pediatric Supportive Services. In September, parents requested that Nicole come into the classrooms to allow students to receive music therapy services in a variety of settings.

Music is at the forefront of both PDLP and EDLP curricula. Through this partnership, students are able to relax in the classroom and explore different materials and instruments they may not have access to on a daily basis.
